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Abstract

This is where one would write an abstract of the paper: a concise summary of the key points of your research. (Do not indent.) 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This is where one would start a paper about Zora Neale Hurston and her writings, particularly *Their Eyes Were Watching God*, her most popular novel. The rest of the paper pretty much follows MLA formatting except for the difference in parenthetical documentation (also known as in-text citations). In MLA format, a summary, paraphrase, or direct quote is followed by the in-text citation of author and page number: (Hurston 143); however, in APA format, a summary, paraphrase, or direct quote is followed by the in-text citation of author, date, and page number: (Hurston, 1965, p. 143).
